Bubble - Colour Quest

1. Have some fun with your whanau or do this individually.
2. Use whatever space you have, this could be in the lounge, the backyard, front yard or even your driveway.
3. Using your creativity, find natural and man-made objects within your surroundings that match each of the colours in the Colour Quest Koru on **Page 3**.
4. Take a photo of each one on your smartphone or tablet – you should end up with a total of eight photos.
5. Once you have your photos; one each for mā (white), whero (red), kakariki (green), pango/mangu (black), kōwhai (yellow), pākākā (brown), kikorangi (blue) and karaka (orange), put them into a collage app.
6. If you don't yet have a collage app we recommend Pic Collage. This can be downloaded for free:

7. Once you have downloaded Pic Collage, select either 'freestyle' or 'grids'.
8. Click on the + symbol at the bottom centre of your screen to open your gallery.
9. Select all eight photos you have taken, then click on the green box with the number and ✓ in the top right corner.
10. When finished, click 'done' and you're ready to save or instantly upload your collage to Instagram so we can see what you've been up to!

Note: If you're using an iPhone and already have an Instagram account you'll instantly be able to share your collage. If you have an Android phone, save your collage to your phone gallery. Then once you are in the Instagram app you can share your saved collage. Remember to use the hashtag **#sportbop** when sharing.

11. If you do not have Instagram, this can be downloaded for free via your app store. Once downloaded, create an account or sign up with Facebook, and start sharing!



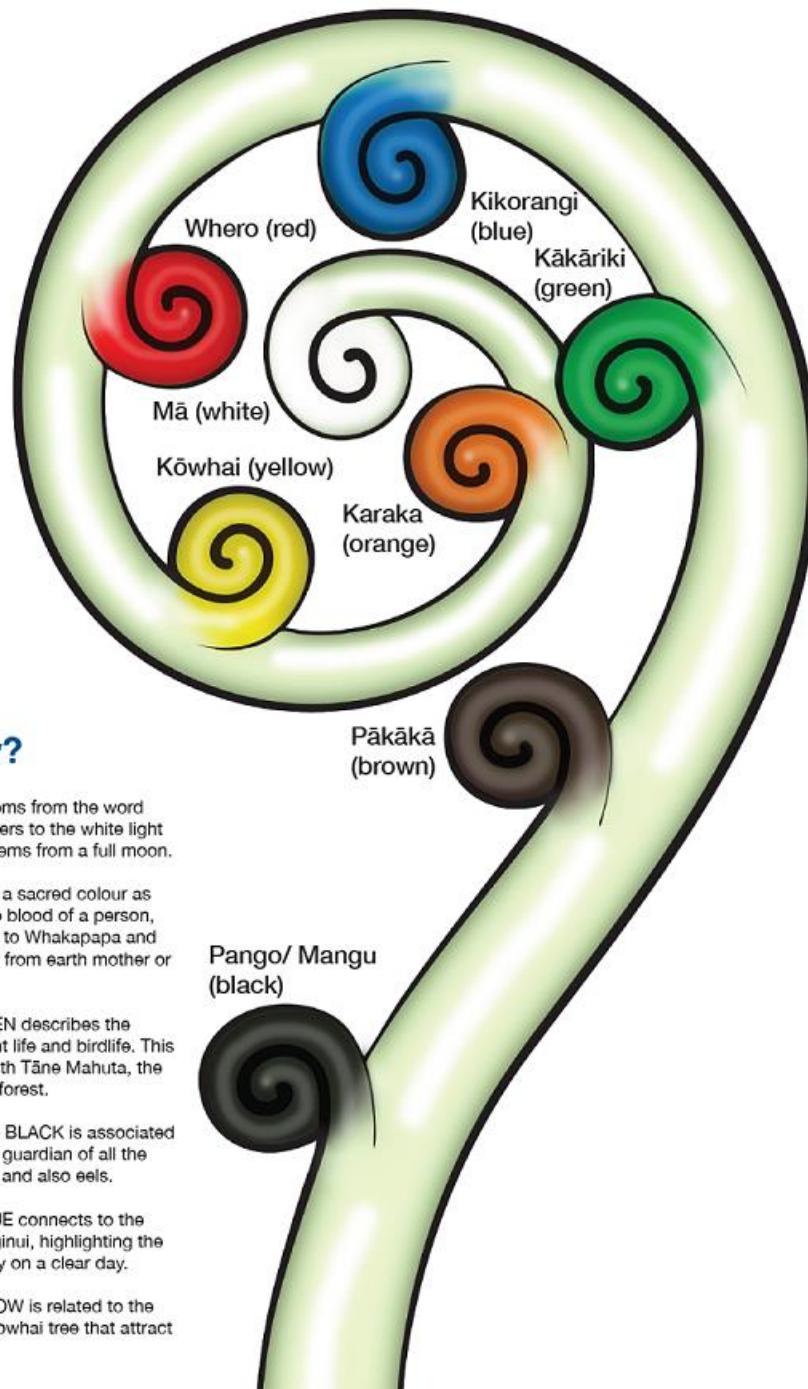

Colour Quest



Did you know?



Mā – WHITE stems from the word Mārama and refers to the white light or clarity that stems from a full moon.



Whero – RED is a sacred colour as it represents the blood of a person, which connects to Whakapapa and the reddish clay from earth mother or Papatuanuku.



Kākāriki – GREEN describes the greenery of plant life and birdlife. This is associated with Tāne Mahuta, the guardian of the forest.



Pango/Mangu – BLACK is associated with Punga, the guardian of all the creepy crawlies and also eels.



Kikorangi – BLUE connects to the sky father, Ranginui, highlighting the colour of the sky on a clear day.



Kōwhai – YELLOW is related to the flowers of the kowhai tree that attract the tui bird.
